English



We will begin this half-term by reading and re-telling a number of different fairy tales before focusing on 'Jack and the Beanstalk'. Throughout this threeweek fiction unit, we will be imitating, innovating and finally inventing our own version of 'Jack and the Beanstalk'. We will be focusing on accurate use

of full stops, capital letters, exclamation marks and question marks, as well as looking at the different word classes (adjective, verb, noun, adverb). In our non-fiction unit, we will be producing biographies on a number of significant history makers. The children will learn the features of a biography and be supported to carry out research before writing their biographies on significant individuals. Throughout all of our writing, we will be making sure to continue to include capital letters, full stops and finger spaces. We will also begin to focus on proof-reading our own writing to check for correct spelling and punctuation.

<u>Spellings</u>



Our spellings for this half-term focus on re-visiting and re-capping the Phase 5 sounds. The children will spend the final week looking at tricky words.

Before being tested each week, the children will have the opportunity to read each word and understand their meanings through daily spelling lessons. A 'look-say-cover-write-check' sheet will also be sent home each week for the children to complete, should they wish to do so. Spelling words will be sent home on a Monday and tested on the following Monday.

Phonics



All children in Year 2 will continue to receive daily phonics lessons throughout the autumn term. We will re-visit the graphemes taught throughout Year 1 in order to continue to build the children's confidence when reading.




Parental involvement in the development of children's reading skills: A five-year longitudinal study (2002) Senechal, M. and Lefvre, J.




